The 1950-51 Girls' Club had a very successful year with forty-four girls as members.


A skating party was held in Sturgis on January 18, 1951. They made \$12,50 on this party which was the most money ever made on a skating party sponsored by Mendon High School.


Mr. Thompson, the coach assisted by Mr. Wier, had the boys hustling and playing heads-up ball.


